From the Pastor

W ell, we've almost made it. Another year is about to be written into the history books. It has been an interesting year, to say the least. It has been a year filled with joy and sorrow, a year of horrible, unspeakable tragedy and jubilant ecstasy. It has been the best of years; it has been the worst of years. Some would like to be able to relive the year, while for others it cannot be gone quickly enough. There are some statistics, however, which are uniform no matter how you feel about 2011. There were a total of 52 weeks, 365 days and 8,760 hours - sufficient time to accomplish many tasks.

Time, like our money, requires good management. We set priorities for the expenditure of our time just as we budget and prioritize the spending of our money. Yet, at the end of any given period of time, we mourn the lack of time to finish a specific task, just as we grieve our shortage of money. The writer of the Book of Ecclesiastes tells us, "There is a time for everything, and a season for everything under the sun."

Many thoughts run through our minds as we come to the end of this year, 2011. Perhaps the first and most pressing thought is the idea that this year has sped by so rapidly. "Why, it seems as if it were only a few weeks ago that we were in a similar position, looking at the last hours of 2010." How time flies in our society. Talk with anyone over the age of 50; they will tell you that time went by much slower "in the 'good' old days."

Truth of the matter is, when God created the day, He gave it a total of 24 hours. That has not changed over the millennia. What has changed, however, is how much we try to stuff into one 24-hour period. Somewhere along the line man decided he had to cram all of the "Times" of Ecclesiastes 3 into the smallest integer of time he could. The day seemed a likely and convenient period of time to use. Subsequently, time took on new attributes: the attributes of a world-class sprinter – speed and singleness of focus.

Solomon's thesis in Ecclesiastes 3 simply calls us back to the reality that no matter how much we attempt to rush it there is a time for everything. Many people rush through life at such a hectic pace that they do not have the opportunity to enjoy the time God has given them for their benefit and enjoyment. Some people go through life at such a fast pace that they think the only attribute a rose has is its thorns. If you are like that, I pray that God will grant you the grace to slow down in 2012, so that you can smell and enjoy the wonderful fragrance of the rose.

Take time this New Year – take time to enjoy God's creation; take time to enjoy the blessings He richly showers on you – the blessing of family and friends; take time to study His Word and grow in it; take time to worship and praise the God who made you, redeemed you and sanctifies you; take time to return to God a portion of the bounty He showers upon you.

I pray for you a blessed and prosperous New Year – The Year of Our Lord, 2012.

A New Beginning

Did you understand the Old Testament Lesson that was read in church last Sunday? I didn't. It came and went so quickly, how can anyone have time to think about it? Sure, it was a story from the Bible, and since it's from the Bible I suppose it's good for me to hear it. My mind didn't wander during the reading (this week), so I really did hear what was read, but to be truthful, an hour later all I could remember about the reading is how distant it had seemed to me. It was from a culture of thousands of years ago. I'm glad I didn't have to read the names of those places—I would never be able to say them without tripping over the syllables—and what does it matter anyway to people in 2012 central New York?

Actually, when I heard the Lessons read in church was not the only time I heard them this week. When I first read them during the week, I really did react like that. "Read it, it's good for you," sounds much like my mother's advice at the table so many years ago. The readings seemed distant and not really connected, not to each other, not to the hymns, and certainly not to me.

But spending time in the Word began to change all that. There are resources available that help me understand how



it fits together. How Isaiah and Matthew connect. How the full meaning of the original Hebrew or Greek is sometimes hard to capture in English without creating text that would be

clumsy to read. How "the way of peace" that Isaiah wrote about in 59:8 becomes the light that shines out of darkness in 60:1-3, and this Way, this Light, is fulfilled as explained in 2 Corinthians 4:6: "God, who said, 'Let light shine out of darkness,' has shone in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ."

It has been my privilege for nearly three years to study the Bible with adults who gather around the Word for an hour every Sunday morning. I have learned *so* much from the experience, and discussions with other participants have made it clear that they have benefited not only by what they have taken away from the class, but by what they have brought to it. Surely it pleases the Holy Spirit to bless us richly through the Word.

We are about to challenge ourselves in a new way. Beginning on January 15, Pastor Bernard will assume primary responsibility for teaching the Sunday morning adult Bible study, and I will be among those who are available to fill in whenever Pastor is not available. We are excited that he will be sharing his many years of education, experience, and insights with us in this new way. Thank you, Pastor Bernard, for taking on this additional task for our congregation.

It has been a great learning experience for me to serve Grace in this capacity over these past years, and I am grateful to the congregation for affording me the privilege. I also want to thank Andrea Dodge and Dave Devan, as well as Pastor, for your willingness to lead the class in my absence. When undertaking a task that must be done every week, it removes a significant burden to have ready and willing assistance. Finally, I thank everyone who has participated in the class over the years. You have made the class so interesting and enjoyable for me, and I have learned more from you than you might ever imagine.

I look forward to continuing to participate in the class in the future, and I offer a New Year's resolution that I know will be a blessing to each of us as God's children: "In 2012 I will open my heart to receive God's Word by participating with other Christians in Bible study. May God enable me to humbly make this promise and to keep it."

On Stewardship

We have just approved a deficit budget for the year 2012. We all know what this means. We need more income. I realize that like

Paul & I, most of us older generations are on a fixed income and for the most part, we are giving as much as we can. We try to contribute in other ways, such as donating our time and talents.

If you are able, I know with God's help you will raise your giving. The days of a dollar or two in the plate each week have long been over. A loaf of bread is three dollars these days. Our utility bills have gone sky high. Unfortunately, this means that the expenses of Grace are also going up. One of the line items marked utilities is \$11,000.00 just by itself. Keep in mind, that as Treasurer Kathy Pavelock explained, the 2012 budget does not include the worker benefits for Pastor. That will come out of a fund we have designated. The expense of \$19,251.00 will wipe out this designated fund at the end of 2012.

Please go over the budget you approved at the Voters meeting and prayerfully consider where you can help.

I know some things that you can do already that are not monetary. You can volunteer!! We need you to sign up to Usher, help with Altar Care, and be part of a cleaning team. We are in need of new blood. I think yours is just the one we are looking for.

May God bless and keep all of you, my church family with a bountiful New Year 2012. With God's help all things are possible and we can make our budget with His help and our commitment.

As of January 1, 2012, I will no longer be Stewardship Chairman, if you are interested in this position, please speak with Paul House.



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From the Pastor

DID YOU KNOW THAT:

Concerning Lent

- 1. The day before Ash Wednesday, called Shrove Tuesday, is celebrated in many parts of the world with great feasts and celebrations?
- 2. In France, Shrove Tuesday is called *Mardi Gras* or *Fat Tuesday?* Perhaps this derives from the expectation that the housewife would use up all her fats and butter in baked goods before Ash Wednesday.
- 3. The use of ashes on Ash Wednesday is an ancient and meaningful custom with roots going back to Biblical times? (Matthew 11:21) The wearing of sackcloth and the use of ashes were signs of repentance. The ashes used in Christian churches today come from the burning of the previous year's Palm Sunday palms.
- 4. Fasting serves a useful and Christian purpose? The early church encouraged the faithful to fast on Fridays (the day Jesus died) and on Wednesdays (the day Judas betrayed Jesus). The food, which would normally have been eaten, was given to

the poor. This is the background and foundation for our Lenten denial.

- 5. Pretzels had their beginning as a Lenten food? German bakers, in observance of the ban on the use of dairy products during Lent, decided to turn out a "legal" food which even looked "religious." The crossed arms of the pretzel were intended to represent a Christian at prayer, with his palms on opposite shoulders, making a crisscross of his forearms. The Latin word for shoulder is *Bracella*, which comes over into the German language as Pretzel.
- 6. Hot Cross Buns probably developed during strict fasts of the Middle Ages? Small loaves of bread were baked and marked with the sign of the cross on the crust. The Hot Cross buns we have today are probably too rich in shortening to have been a Lenten food in the Middle Ages.
- 7. The English word *Lent* comes from the folklore of the Germanic tribes? *Lencten* has the same root as *lengthen* and stands for the time of Spring when daylight increases and the days lengthen.
- 8. The forty days of Lent correspond to Jesus' forty days in the wilderness?

These facts about Lent, while perhaps interesting, are really not terribly important. The most important fact is that Jesus Christ suffered and died for your sins and my sins. Lent is a time to think about your sins and what it truly means that Jesus suffered and died for them. Lent is a time to draw closer to God; a time to worship more regularly and frequently; a time to read the Bible more diligently and a time to share the Gospel of Christ more enthusiastically. Lent is a *Quiet Place*. Lent is a closer walk with Jesus along the way of sorrows, the Via Delarosa toward the bright and glorious morning of Easter and the Resurrection.




Newsletter News





From the Pastor

t's a pretty good crowd, don't you think, Pastor?" one of our members said as she shook my hand Easter Sunday. "Do you think it will make a difference?" "Will what make a difference?" I asked. "Easter," she replied. "Will Easter make a difference to all the people who were here? Or will tomorrow be just like yesterday and all the days before it?"

As we read the book of Acts, we find that the lives of the followers of Jesus were anything but wonderful and marvelous after His resurrection. For Stephen faith in Jesus meant a barrage of life-taking stones. For Paul it meant a prison cell and eventual death in Rome. For St. John it meant exile on a deserted island, far from the rest of civilization; for St. Peter it meant crucifixion on a cross, upside down. For those who followed Jesus, Easter made a difference, all right, a spiritual difference.

First, the resurrection difference was the knowledge that they were living in the presence of a risen, living Savior. They had seen Jesus, dead and buried, and now He was alive. Three days before Easter Sunday they were sure Jesus was dead. They were sure that God had abandoned not only Jesus, but also them. Then, on Easter, their world was again turned upside down. Jesus was standing in their midst, talking with them, eating with them, and fellowshipping with them. God had not abandoned them. Christ was alive.

Even today, when there are times it seems God has abandoned us, and we all have those times, the truth is it is we who have moved away from God, not God who moved away from us. Even when we question why God does not intervene and do something; why evil seems to have the upper hand, why God seems so oblivious to our pain and our tears, why He appears to be silent in the face of our tears and prayers, the Resurrection difference is that God is right here with us, walking along beside us, holding our hand, upholding us, and carrying us when the journey becomes too wearisome.

Secondly, the Resurrection difference meant a profound sense of peace to the Disciples. Jesus came to His followers and said, "Peace, be with you." The peace of the resurrected Christ was not a tranquil and serene life; neither was it the absence of conflict. Rather, the Peace of Christ is an intangible sense of being well, the deep and abiding conviction that all is well between God and you and that you have nothing to worry about because God is in control.

Thirdly, the Resurrection difference means new life: new life in Christ; life marked with a higher purpose. The disciples declared, "We have seen The Lord!" But Thomas had not experienced this Resurrection Difference. He was still living his life, doing his own thing. "I will not believe, until I see, until I touch. In the meantime, leave me alone." And Jesus said, "Thomas. Come see, come touch. Do not doubt, believe." It was then Thomas experienced the difference. You and I experience the Resurrection difference in the same Word, in the Eucharist. Jesus calls us, "Come, see. Come hear. Come, Take and eat, take and drink. It is really I."

Finally, the Resurrection difference is power. When Jesus spoke His word of peace, He breathed on His disciples and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit." God not only gives us Christians a job to do, He also gives us the tools, the know-how and the power to get the job done. He gives us the power of the Holy Spirit. It is the Spirit that gives us the power, the courage, the strength to cope with the problems and difficulties of life.

The Resurrection of Jesus Christ made a real difference to the followers of our Lord in the first century. In time they were bolder, freer, more open, more courageous, more loving. Of this there is no doubt. But, the question is still with us: the question asked by the **woman on Easter, "Will Easter make a difference," for you, for me? It can, of course.** We can be new people, turned on for Jesus, living in His peace, sharing His love, His Gospel. We can live as newly recreated sons and daughters of the Risen Lord, putting aside selfish pride, self-centered ideas and actions, using the gifts He so richly and freely gives us to love and serve Him and our fellow man. It is all a matter of faith: not faith in ourselves and our own abilities, but faith in the Son of God who loved us and gave Himself for us. And it all starts with a heart-felt confession, the confession of Thomas: "My Lord and my God." Let Christ's Resurrection make a difference in your life.



At Council

The following is an independent account of the Church Council meetings that have been held since the last newsletter. It has not been endorsed or approved by the Council itself. It is a summary of the discussions at the meetings and may not cover all topics that were addressed.

March 20, 2012

Treasurer provided a report and noted donations of \$10,000 toward a parking lot and \$600 toward a playground.

Christian Education reports that Sunday School classes are preparing for Palm Sunday and Easter, and will work on the memorization program in the following weeks. The date for VBS has not yet been set.

LWML reports about the upcoming convention in June and Spring Rally in May. Discussed success of Health & Wellness Fair participation.

Evangelism reports upcoming Relay for Life events and Family Movie event, as well as continuing work on completing the tri-fold brochure.

Property Care reports that town officials will be inspecting the premises monthly now for fire safety. Stained glass windows are getting set to be posted on Craig's List. Quotes for parking lot construction will be received once specifications can be produced.

Board of Deacons reports an individual has been approached to fill the role of Head Usher. No response has been given yet.

Howard and Christine Jones have agreed to run for Stewardship co-Chairs. They will be presented before the next voters assembly to be voted into this position.

Paul House and Steve Devan will review proposed changes to the bylaws so these changes can be recommended to the next voters assembly.

No New Business was brought forward during this meeting.



<u>April 17, 2012</u>

Treasurer provided a report and recommended moving some funds to cover utility and mortgage payments for the remainder of the year. Concern was voiced over the current financial status of the church, and after some discussion it was agreed to bring this concern to the next voters assembly.

LWML discusses the upcoming rally and excitedly reports receiving a \$3,700 grant for the Burmese Mission Project.

Music reports that the action for the piano has gone to the shop for repairs, unfortunately surpassing the established music budget. The piano is expected to be in service before the next worship. In addition, Karen has requested Aaron to play organ on alternating Sunday mornings, beginning in May. Aaron accepted. Dana will continue to serve in absences and in winter as before.

Publicity reports shortage of letters for the road-side sign and requests ordering one additional set of lettering.

Property care reports the stained glass windows have been posted on Craig's List. No viable offers have been received yet. Spring Cleaning is planned for April 27 & 28. The tractor, which had broken in the fall, is now functioning normally again for no apparent reason.

In New Business, Grace has won from Camp Pioneer one night of retreat for an individual, couple, or family to be given to one of its members. This will be brought to the voters during the next assembly.

The Council will be exploring a proposal to join the Canastota Church Community.

The electrical grounding issue (concerning the static pops heard regularly in the sound system) was discussed. Certain Council members do not believe the building grounding is insufficient, but it was recommended to bring in a sound equipment professional to assess the situation.





From the Pastor

t's Summer. Life has slowed down. The living is easy. Schools are out. Vacation schedules are of immediate concern. Where will we go? What will we do? Go to the beach? Go to the mountains? Camp in the park? Summer is so short. Weekends are so precious. We must take full advantage of every moment. We must be good stewards of our summer.

It's Summer. What is going on in the church? Not much? Oh, yes, there are thoughts of Vacation Bible School. How hot will it be this Sunday? Will the fans be of any help? There are no special services: Easter, Christmas, nothing like that. Our brothers and sisters in the Roman Catholic Church call this part of the Church Year, Ordinary Time. Nothing special going on. Routine, ordinary services. Missing a few won't make any difference: sort of like missing an episode or two of your favorite soap opera.

Ordinary Time — yes, but if we look at our relationship with God and the church we will find some pretty Extraordinary things going on. Take a look, for example, at the color of the Paraments and Vestments next time you come to worship. Green is the color of life and growth.

The theme of the convention was based on Isaiah 54:10 "... *my steadfast love shall not depart and my convent of peace shall not be removed* ..." As always, I returned refreshed and inspired!

More to "Going Green" Than You May Think

and to lift our voices to song.



Checking out at the store, the young cashier suggested to the older woman that she should bring her own shopping bags because plastic bags weren't good for the environment. The woman apologized and

explained, 'We didn't have this green thing back in my earlier days."

The cashier responded, "That's our problem today. Your generation did not care enough to save our environment for future generations."

She was right — our generation didn't have the green thing in its day. Back then, we returned milk bottles, soda bottles and beer bottles to the store. The store sent them back to the plant to be washed and sterilized and refilled, so it could use the same bottles over and over. So they really were recycled. We refilled writing pens with ink instead of buying a new pen, and we replaced the razor blades in a razor instead of throwing away the whole razor just because the blade got dull, but *we didn't have the green thing back in our day.*

We walked up stairs, because we didn't have an escalator in every shop and office building. We walked to the grocery store and didn't climb into a 300-horsepower machine every time we had to go two blocks. But she was right. *We didn't have the green thing in our day*. Back then, we washed the baby's diapers because we didn't have the throw-away kind. We dried clothes on a line, not in an energy gobbling machine burning up 220 volts — wind and solar power really did dry our clothes back in our early days. Kids got hand-me-down clothes from their brothers or sisters, not always brand-new clothing. But that young lady is right. *We didn't have the green thing back in our day*.

Back then, we had one TV, or radio, in the house—not a TV in every room—and the TV had a small screen the size of a handkerchief (remember them?), not a screen the size of Madison County. In the kitchen, we blended and stirred by hand because we didn't have electric machines to do everything for us. When we packaged a fragile item to send in the mail, we used wadded up old newspapers to cushion it, not styrofoam or plastic bubble wrap. Back then, we didn't fire up an engine and burn gas just to cut the lawn. We used a push mower that ran on human power. We exercised by working so we didn't need to go to a health club to run on treadmills that operate on electricity. But she's right. *We didn't have the green thing back then*.

We drank water from a fountain or a tap when we were thirsty instead of demanding a plastic bottle flown in from another country. We accepted that a lot of food was seasonal and didn't expect that to be bucked by flying it thousands of air miles around the world. We actually cooked food that didn't come out of a packet, tin or plastic wrap and we could even wash our own vegetables and chop our own salad. *But we didn't have the green thing back then*.

Back then, people took the bus, and kids rode their bikes to school or walked instead of turning their mothers into a 24-hour taxi service. We had one electrical outlet in a room, not an entire bank of sockets to power a dozen appliances, and we didn't need a computerized gadget to receive a signal beamed from satellites 2,000 miles out in space in order to find the nearest pizza joint.

But isn't it sad that the current generation laments how wasteful we old folks were just because we didn't have the green thing back then?

2012 Eastern District Convention

The 2012 Convention of the Eastern District, Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod was held at Daemen College, Amherst, New York on June 15, 16 under the theme CHOSEN; based on 1 Peter 2:9 – "But you are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's special possession, that you may declare the praises of him who called you out of darkness into his wonderful light"

During the course of the convention the following people of interest to Grace members were elected to their respective offices: The Reverend Chris Wicher, President, The Reverend David Bernard, Vice President – Rochester Region, The Reverend Walter Schneider, Circuit Counselor – Central New York North circuit, Mr. Mark Lambrecht, Lay Director Board of Directors – Rochester Region, Mrs. Kathy Pavlock, Lay member – Nominating Committee.

The resolution to encourage our congregations to make disciple-making a top priority, to support and participate in local and regional mission initiatives was approved. District leadership is challenged to establish new mission and ministry starts, to train and develop lay leaders and to form clusters of congregations that will work together as we move into the future that God has prepared for us.

Resolution 1-02 encourages the Board of Directors to form a task force to assist congregations in seeking opportunities to "reinvent" themselves in order that the Kingdom of God might grow in their communities.

The Circuits of our District were re-aligned to more accurately express demographics and facilitate equitable representation at Synodical conventions. This puts us in agreement with the restructuring of Synod in the 2010 Convention.

A resolution to exclusively use only the Lutheran Service Book at all District Gatherings was defeated.

The convention heard about a team of Evangelists from Eastern District congregations who attended Nik Walenda's wire walk across Niagara Falls as an intentional Christian Witness presence.

Delegates voted on what Mission and Ministry emphases should be forwarded to Synod through the Eastern District Board of Directors as a memorial to the 2013 Synod Convention at St Louis. The following were voted the top three and will be submitted:

- 1. Small Church Ministry Support and Material
- 2. Men's Ministry Encouragement and Resources
- 3. Evangelism Training

At Council

The following is an independent account of the Church Council meetings that have been held since the last newsletter. It has not been endorsed or approved by the Council itself. It is a summary of the discussions at the meetings and may not cover all topics that were addressed.

<u>May 2012</u>

Council does not meet in the same month as a quarterly Voter's Assembly.

<u>June 19, 2012</u>

A quorum was not present at this meeting. No voting was possible.

<u>Treasurer</u> provided a report noting that receipts were higher than usual for the month of April. However, total receipts were still less than total disbursements.

<u>Christian Education</u> announces that Sunday School is in recess for the summer, and reminds Council about the upcoming VBS program. Planning is underway for Fall 2012, and the reinstating of a Kindergarten class.

<u>LWML</u> reports on the recent Eastern District Convention, attended and enjoyed by a number of ladies from Grace. Distribution of money from the \$3,700 Burmese Mission Project grant has begun.

Music Chairman was not able to attend. An unofficial report was given by Aaron Bahr, stating the choir will sing once more on June 24, and then go into recess for the summer.

<u>Property Care</u> reports that a party is interested in buying all remaining stained glass windows. Council members in attendance recommended to sell the windows, pending review of the Voter's Assembly decision which authorized placing the windows on Craig's List. Steve Devan will meet with Barry Kirch on Thursday to make progress with repairing the church building's roof and ceiling. The Town of Lenox, which had requested use of our parking lot for storage during an upcoming water project, will need to be named as additional insurers so Grace will remain faultless if anything should happen. Documents will be required to this effect before any items may be stored.

A request to use the fellowship hall & kitchen for a family reunion has been changed to June 29, 1:00 pm.

<u>Elder</u> was unable to attend. Deacon Glen Bahr gave an unofficial report, reminding Council that Pastor Bernard will be attending a family reunion in Texas on June 24, so there will be no communion that Sunday.


In <u>Unfinished Business</u>, all work on paving the parking lot has been put on hold until the Town of Lenox water project has been completed and all equipment and supplies have been removed. Changes to the bylaws have been completed, and will be presented to Council during the next meeting for review and discussion. Council will post **proposed bylaws at least 30 days before the next Voter's** Assembly.

In <u>New Business</u>, additional bulletin board locations were discussed, as current arrangement of bulletin boards has not proven effective at distributing pertinent information. Three trees have been planted in front of the church, purchased with donations through Mary Martha LWML.

Paul House has submitted a letter of resignation as both Deacon and Congregation President. Further details were unavailable at the time of the meeting.





From the Pastor

W e are a society obsessed with food. Put us in a buffet and they have to use small plates – so we do not stock up for the whole week with one plate. Right along with our obsession with food is our obsession with losing weight. Andy Rooney once remarked that the two biggest sellers in any bookstore were the cookbooks and the diet books. The cookbooks tell you how to prepare delicious looking and tasting food and the diet books tell you how to avoid eating it.

A scientist in California has computed that the average human being eats 16 times his or her own weight in an average year. A horse, so the scientist has determined, eats 8 times its weight. The conclusion, obviously, is quite clear: if you want to lose weight, you need to eat like a horse.

Orson Wells once said, "My doctor has advised me to give up those intimate little dinners for four, unless, of course, there are three other people dining with me."

A recent survey found that 41% of men and 55% of women consider themselves overweight. And those who mourn their excess weight have been known to go to extraordinary— OK, ridiculous lengths to shed a few pounds. Example: A mail order company came out with "Slim-Skins," plastic pants with a "patented" hose connection. Simply connect the hose from your vacuum cleaner to the pants via the "patented" connector, start your vacuum cleaner and enjoy the results. They claim their pants will remove two-and-one-half- inches from your waist; four inches from your stomach; two inches from your hips; three inches from each thigh. Oh, yes, it will also remove about \$2,500 from your bank account, all in about twenty minutes.

If only we were this obsessed with spiritual food. You would think that many Christians today were on a spiritual diet the way they seem to take "just enough" nourishment to survive.

Jesus said, "I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty." When He said that the people around Him replied, "Sure, Jesus, whatever you say." But then, they questioned – "Who does this guy think he is? We know His parents. We know where He was born and raised. He is certainly no one special. Bread of life, indeed." And they took offense at Him.

No group of people has been more wrong. "I am the living bread that came down from heaven," Jesus declared. The one and only Son of God who came to seek and to save those who were lost, lost in their sins, lost in their doubts, lost in their hunger. Those who were estranged from God.

Mark was brought up a Lutheran, but he said that he was never very impressed by the church, all the ceremony, the liturgy, the Sacraments. He claimed he did not really understand most of what went on in the church, at worship. After high school he did not set foot in a church for about ten years. After college and graduate school he got married – yes in the church. It would be five more years before he would enter the church again.

Mark and his wife were blessed with the birth of a son. He was the joy of their lives. Two years after his birth, their son was killed in an automobile accident. Nothing anyone said could touch or comfort Mark. He felt empty. A week after the funeral Mark and his wife decided to attend worship at the Lutheran Church where the funeral had been held.

As he sat there Mark became painfully aware of how far he had strayed from the God who had sent His own Son to suffer and die for him. He was empty inside, starving, spiritually anemic.

Mark and Kathy went to Communion that morning. He remembers that as the Pastor stepped in front of him and offered him the bread he said, "This is the Body of Christ, broken for you." Mark says he experienced a flood of God's love going from his mouth to his toes as he ate the bread. Mark and Kathy reaffirmed their faith and became members of the church. In fact, Mark entered Seminary and in six months, God willing, will be ordained into the Holy Ministry

You and I come to the same altar; receive the same nourishment. Our hunger is satisfied, our emptiness filled with the same bread of life. Jesus feeds us with His Word, He calls us to, "Come take and eat; take and drink. My body and My blood, given and shed for you."

When Jesus fed the 5,000 there was plenty left over – enough to feed many more. There are countless souls outside these walls who hunger and thirst for the truth of God's Love and Grace in Christ Jesus. The Epistle Lesson from last week reminded us that we are all ministers, called by God to share His love with others.

When we leave here today we can truly say that we have been fed with the Bread of Life. In Word and Sacrament God nourishes us and promises that those who eat of this life-giving bread which came down from heaven will never die.

Dear friends of Jesus – when we have finished eating here today at the Lord's Table there will be an abundance of leftovers. Our God is a bountiful provider. Take some of this Bread of Life with you. Share it with someone who is hungry or empty.

"I am the Bread of Life. Whoever comes to me and eats will not be hungry." Are you physically full but spiritually starved for the Living Bread? Come to the Lord's Table and be filled. Then, give the food you receive here to another who is dying of hunger.

Statement in Response to U.S. Supreme Court Ruling on Health Care Reform Law

June 28, 2012

In light of today's ruling by the U.S. Supreme Court on the constitutionality of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPACA), we remain opposed to the controversial birth control mandate, which is one of the requirements included in the law.

The Court's decision today guarantees that we will continue to bring awareness to the threat to religious liberty represented by the birth control mandate, which requires virtually all health plans, including those of religious organizations, to cover birth control drugs and products that could cause the death of the unborn. We are opposed to the birth control mandate because it runs counter to the biblical truth of the sanctity of human life and creates a conflict of conscience for religious employers and insurers, who face steep penalties for non-compliance based upon their religious convictions.

We will continue to stand with those who have filed suit in the many religious freedom cases pending against the birth control mandate. Through education and civic advocacy, we will continue to educate the public about the vital necessity of protecting our First Amendment right to act according to the tenets of our faith. We remain steadfast in our opposition to the birth control mandate and will continue working to ensure our right to refrain from paying for products and services that conflict with our doctrine about the sanctity of all human life.

And, regardless of the Court's decision on the health care reform law, we in the LCMS will continue to uphold the sanctity of all human life while we care for the sick and work to restore the health and well-being of people in our communities and around the world.



From the Pastor

am in one of those reflective moods - sickness and medical issues will do that to a person sometimes – so I guess I will use this column to vent and challenge this time around.

First of all – <u>THANK YOU</u> to those who have called; emailed and sent cards to Ruth and me this past week and a half. We are thankful for your prayers and thoughtfulness. For Ruth, I still seek your prayers - we still seek answers. Jeremiah 29:11 comforts us.

What does your Christian faith mean to you? As a past circuit Counselor and current Regional Vice President, I have often found myself in strange and sometimes uncomfortable circumstances. This past week I heard of a congregation that is canceling its mid-week Advent and Lenten services - to save money. What's that all about? The Church of Jesus Christ – existing to make money – or put another way - to not lose money. Seems as if someone had calculated the extra services would "Cost too much money for the number of people who would attend," and the congregation cancelled services.

Call me out of touch, but would it not be the "right thing to do" for the members to encourage greater participation in those worship services? Or maybe the Church changed things and I was not notified. I Guess I will have to reread my old Greek Text and see if Jesus says in Matthew 18:20 "Wherever 50 or more are gathered in My name..." or if in Matthew 28 He said, "Go and get more money in the plate and bodies in the pews in order to be financially solvent."

It's coming again. You know it - the Holiday Season. The commercial world has been preparing for Christmas for a couple of months now. The Church traditionally takes a slower, more contemplative attitude. December 25th will come the day after December 24th no matter how we rush our preparations. Let's slow down and wait patiently: remember: today is the oldest you've ever been, yet the youngest you'll ever be - so - slow down, enjoy and thank God for his bounty.

Here's one that left me with my lower jaw somewhere down around my ankles. I met with a group of people (OK, a church) a while back because they were having some problems. I encouraged them and offered that the very first and most important thing they needed to do was to come together regularly and PRAY. They told me ... are you ready for this? They told me ... oh yes, did I mention that this was a Lutheran Church? They told me: "We have done that already. It did not work." Lord, have mercy!

I sometimes get very uncomfortable when people refer to our national Day of Thanksgiving as "Turkey Day" and then go about gorging themselves on food and crashing in front of the "flat screen" for an extended inoculation of football punctuated by a nap and more food. In days gone by, Thanksgiving Day was a day dedicated to giving thanks to Almighty God for His many blessings, for His protection and for the bounty of the harvest. People gathered in their houses of worship; they gathered around bounty-filled tables in their homes and they celebrated the blessings and goodness of our Gracious God. Let's return to that kind of Thanksgiving celebration.

It's fall and churches typically undertake Stewardship campaigns. And members typically stay home so they do not have to hear about the church's need for money. I was just thinking - Do you like your church? Do you like being able to come to church on Sunday? Do you like the fact that the heat works on those cold fall and winter Sundays? Do you like the candles, the banners, the hymnals, the paraments, all the stuff that makes this place your church? Do you like the fact that we have a very active Sunday School? Do you like the fact that we support mission endeavors around the world?

Do you know how all that happens? Yeah, someone has to pay the utility bills, the salaries; someone has to pay for the educational material, for the worship supplies, for the repairs and upkeep of the building. Do you know that the church relies on the work of dedicated and passionate volunteers to do much of its work? And did you know that all those costs and many more <u>have not risen</u> in the past fifty years, and that the church has many more volunteers than it has opportunities to serve?

• Well, OK, all of that was true, except for the last statement. Consider your stewardship of God's gifts. Consider what will happen when the church you attend is no longer able to pay its bills. Consider what will happen when no one is willing to volunteer, etc. Then what will you do? Where will you go? Ask yourself now, "What is God calling me to do for His Church?"

Thanks for indulging me and reading this. May God bless you and your stewardship of His bounty.

The Calling

I was recently asked to write an article about my teaching and what I love about it. At first glance this is an easy question to answer but in actuality it is not. Most Teachers have a lifespan in the profession of 5 years. I wonder how that can be since I have known a few teachers working into thirty and forty years. It is the vast amount of people coming into the profession that leave after a year or two in search of grander opportunities. I have been tempted throughout my career to leave the profession in search of more money or somewhere with a clock to punch in and out without bringing any work home with me. When Harford Lutheran was closing I stood before my 8th grade class with teary eyes as they asked me what I would do now. I informed them that I was good with my hands and had worked construction before. I did chef work at a restaurant up in New York and have worked sometime in the music industry as a side. These I said are things I can do, but this as I pointed at them was what I wanted to do. That is when I received the call from Trinity (My present employer) and continued on the mission L chose.

One stipulation for Trinity was that I would teach Christian Education. I was very nervous at this news. I had taught Latin, Spanish, Carpentry, Music, Social Studies, Literature, Physical Education, English, Grammar, and even some Math. Christian Ed. was not on my repertoire list and I wasn't sure I was the right candidate for the job. I started thinking back to my childhood and shook my head. How in God's name am I going to be able to pull this one off? I mean when I was 7 I was the last person on earth that people around were thinking would lead Youth on their Christian life walk. I accepted the challenge prayerfully and here I am today teaching Civics, Physical Education and Christian Education. This calling by trinity converted me into a better teacher and person.

I think that the biggest challenge in my teaching is that the kids now days have much more to deal with than I ever did. Almost half of my students come from homes of separated or divorced parents. The attitude in the house points fingers at the other parent often leaving my student caught in the middle. More than 50% of my students do not attend church on any sort of basis other than weekly Chapel. My students are also sheltered and over nurtured. Because of this fact, when something goes wrong in their life they do not know how to deal with it correctly. When something is out of control they think they can demand it back into control and when this does not work, they break down. Bullying is at an all-time high and the kids cannot escape it. When I was a kid we could go home and have respite for a night but they have texting and internet where they cannot escape. I also have now come to realize that I am the only male avenue to God in their lives. This puts an awful lot of pressure on me that I do enjoy. The challenge of all this is what I focus most of my Teaching preparation on.

Jesus always taught us about seeds in the Bible. In Matthew we learn about the Sower (Matthew 13: 1-22). This shows us the different areas these seeds fall on to grow into plants. I consider all my students my seeds and myself, the path that they have fallen on. It is now my responsibility to be the Gardner to produce the plant. I need to water them a lot, but not enough to drown them. I need to give them enough light but not enough to burn them out. Their minds and attitudes are so fragile in this state I have to be on guard and prepared for their every question and concern. I am not the only Gardner in this equation so how do I make sure they stay upright in their walk with God? It is tough to learn how much and what these kids need to learn to love Jesus unconditionally and eternally. In some cases their parents resist and the kids want to go to church but their parents will not bring them. Sometimes the students receive the message but hit resistance in their neighborhoods or homes and the message fades. I always tell myself each year that if I can reach just one student who isn't sure of their Christianity and make them a true believer, it is all worth it. It makes 65 hour coaching weeks and in-service days worth every minute.

I never thought this is where I would be in my life. I always thought I would be doing something else making so much more money living somewhere so much more interesting doing what I wanted always. I thought I would have huge parties and play tricks on authority. I thought I would travel the world and visit exotic places buying exotic things. I thought I would play sports forever and be a star. Now the thought of any of that sounds awful compared to what I have in my calling. This I owe to all the familiar faces from that little church in that little town in central New York. Remembering what my parents instilled and the Church supported throughout my youth made possible what I do today. Thank you for the help in my calling.




